PRAYERS & INSTRUCTION

St. Joseph of Cupertino

This Saturday, September 18, is the feastday of St. Joseph of Cupertino. Joseph Desa was born into a poor family in the Kingdom of Naples on June 17, 1603. He was a daydreamy, clumsy, and unsuccessful village cobbler's apprentice, who was turned down for admission by the Franciscans when 17.

With another attempt, he was finally admitted on probation, and was assigned to tend to the mules. Since he was gentle and affectionate, all the mules soon realized they could act as they pleased in his presence, and he was consequently dismissed after only eight months.

One of his Franciscan uncles however pulled some strings, and he finally became a Conventual Franciscan tertiary and servant in 1625. It was then that Joseph suddenly "took off" as it were — something he later became very famous for!

He soon became a model of angelic purity of spirit, of humility, of patience

under severe criticism, and especially of obedience. In view of his poor scholarship, it was evident that Heaven itself taught him many of the profound things he knew. His priestly life of great mortification and obedience began with his ordination in 1628, including his legendary fasting seems to have left him with stomach trouble until his very death. He greatly suffered too, in spirit for a number of years.



Then came the profound peace and calm - and the levitations. St. Joseph of Cupertino levitated before reliable witnesses, sometimes hundreds of witnesses at once, at least 70 times in his life far more than any other saint in Catholic history. He flew farther than the Wright brothers, and maybe faster, and is named the patron saint of air travelers! He became a spiritual tourists' attraction; some came for help and others out of curiosity, but God sorted them out. The Lutheran Duke of Brunswick and Hanover came in mere curiosity, but became a Catholic after he saw and believed.

People from across Europe arrived to see him, which began to be problematic for the Franciscans, perhaps even an embarrassment to some. Fr. Desa (*St. Joseph*) was repeatedly reassigned during his life, but it seems, later on, that his Franciscan brothers only wanted to protect him from the crowds that always succeeded to find him.

A legendary preacher and confessor, his spiritual advice was well valued. His one council regarding scruples was and still is of great value: "I like neither scruples nor melancholy. Let your intention be right, and don't be afraid."

St. Joseph of Cupertino died on September 18, 1663 and was canonized in 1767.

G ospel. Luke 14, 1-11. At that time, when Jesus went into the house of one of the chief of the pharisees on the Sabbath day to eat bread, they watched Him. And behold, there was a certain man before Him that had the dropsy: and Jesus an-

swering, spoke to the lawyers and Pharisees, saying, Is it lawful to heal on the Sabbath day? But they held their peace: but He taking him, healed him, and sent him away. And answering them, He said, Which of you shall have an ass or an ox fall into a pit, and will not immediately draw him out on the Sabbath day? And they could not answer Him these things. And He spoke a parable also to them that were invited, marking how they chose the first seats at the table, saying to them, When thou art invited to a wedding, sit not down in the first place, lest perhaps one more honorable than thou be invited by him; and he that invited thee and him, come and say to thee, Give this man place; and then thou begin with shame to take the lowest place. But when thou art invited, go sit down in the lowest place: that when he who inviteth thee cometh, he may say to thee, Friend, go up higher: then shalt thou have glory before them that sit at table with thee: because every one that exalteth himself shall be humbled, and he that humbleth himself shall be exalted.

Postcommunion. In Thy loving kindness, purify our souls, we beseech Thee, O Lord, and renew them with the heavenly sacrament, that we may receive bodily assistance thereby, both for this life and for the life to come. Through our Lord.

Seven Sorrows of the Blessed Virgin Mary

The Blessed Virgin Mary revealed to St. Bridget of Sweden (1303-1373) that seven graces are granted to souls who honor her daily by praying seven Ave's and meditating on her tears and dolors.

- 1. I will grant peace to their families.
- 2. They will be enlightened about the divine mysteries.
- 3. I will console them in their pains and I will accompany them in their work.
- 4. I will give them as much as they ask for as long as it does not oppose the adorable will of my divine Son or the sanctification of their souls.
- 5. I will defend them in their spiritual battles with the infernal enemy and I will protect them at every instant of their lives.
- 6. I will visibly help them at the moment of their death, they will see the face of their Mother.
- 7. I have obtained (this Grace) from my divine Son, that those who propagate this devotion to my tears and dolors, will be taken directly from this earthly life to eternal happiness since all their sins will be forgiven and my Son and I will be their eternal consolation and joy.

St. Alphonsus Liguori testifies to complementary revelations given by Our Lord to St. Elizabeth of Hungary (1207-1231) where Jesus further promises four special graces to those dedicated to the sufferings of the co-redeeming Mother:

- 1. That those who before death invoke the Blessed Mother in the name of her sorrows, should obtain true repentance of all their sins.
- 2. That He would protect in their tribulations all who remember this devotion, and that He would protect them especially at the hour of death.
- 3. That He would impress upon their minds the remembrance of His Passion, and that they should have their reward for it in Heaven.
- 4. That He would commit such devout clients to the hands of Mary, so that she might obtain for these souls all the graces she wanted to lavish upon them.
